## Gasholder News from Mr Gareth Taylor, Land Generation Manager for National Grid

I'd like to extend my thanks to those who joined us for our community open-evening in April. It was great to hear about your interest in the project and we hope you enjoyed learning more about the gasholders.

For those who were unable to join us, I wanted to provide you with an update on the project to date. National Grid is dismantling the two gasholders and clearing associated infrastructure at its site at Aylestone Road, Leicester.

These gasholders are no longer used to store gas and have been unused for several years. With this in mind, we are dismantling the gasholders and regenerating the land where they are located.

Over the past few months, National Grid has been working with VHE Construction, the contractors in charge of the project, to prepare for the dismantling of the two gasholders. This has involved surveys to better understand the site and make preparations for the safe dismantling of the gasholders. We have now finished a programme of dewatering for the first gasholder and are in the process of dewatering the second gasholder, which involves removing water that had previously been stored in the gasholders as a protective layer when they were operational.

representatives from Leicester City Council and the Aylestone Meadows Appreciation Society on a tour of the site, to demonstrate how we are taking into consideration the protection of plants and animals in the area surrounding the gasholders.

We began dismantling the gasholders in May, where VHE Construction began taking apart the first gasholder, starting with the roof and moving on to the lifts. The lifts are telescoping inner walls of the gasholder which would rise and fall when gas filled the chamber within the gasholder. VHE Construction will begin taking apart the second gasholder in June.

We anticipate that we will finish the project by Winter 2016, and will be sharing further updates on the project through this newsletter.

Once we are finished dismantling the gasholders, we plan to undertake a programme of environmental improvement work in order to bring the site back into beneficial use.

# A Sign of the Times

Park Hill House featured in recent articles and the importance of keeping the traces of history alive was highlighted, passing on stories between neighbours, friends and relatives.

Most traces of the big house have disappeared except for several 'railing-scarred' pier caps that can be found atop driveway pillars around Park Hill Drive or the blue brick coping stones topping garden walls or scattered below the topsoil of local gardens.

In our last house, when we were excavating the garden for building works, we managed to unearth a large stone sphere of unknown origin that had been buried beneath a metre of soil. The 'ball' has travelled with us to our present house.

Other clues to more famous local residents can be found by looking for commemorative signs or plaques.



On Richmond Road for instance there is a Blue Plaque for Lord Snow – not John Snow, Lord Commander of the Night's Watch of 'Game of Thrones' fame but Charles Percy (CP) Snow, Novelist, Scientist and Government Administrator who was born in Leicester in 1905 and studied at Leicester University until 1928 when he left for Cambridge. His thirty year, eleven volume literary masterpiece 'Strangers and Brothers' has been serialised recently on Radio 4. Snow's The Two Cultures and the Scientific Revolution considered the impact of differences between the two approaches of Science versus Humanities and how this had held back World development.

The sign is difficult to spot as it's on the side of No38 where

it was moved to after being displayed on the front of a small factory that was demolished to make way for a group of new-build houses.

CP's elder brother Eric was a renowned historian who recorded much of the early history of Leicestershire County Cricket Club and his Ping-Pong playing younger brother Phillip was Assistant District Commissioner to Fiji, and later played a major part in seeing Fiji recognised by New Zealand as a First Class Cricket team.

One doesn't have to look far though to find signs of previous house occupiers.

Our own house has a series of mysterious chalk markings on the garage walls that prompted all sorts of possible explanations as to what the lettering stood for. The previous owner had lived there for about forty years and we attributed the markings to him - but he was not responsible.

Whilst working in the garden a couple of years ago, a middle-aged gentleman arrived on a motorcycle and introduced himself. He had lived in the house as a child (c 1964) and asked if he could look around at the changes we were making. He pointed out all sorts of familiar places around the rooms and recounted family stories about life there with his parents and his sister throughout the 1960s. When we reached the garage he went straight to the chalk lettering and explained their connection. His name was Robert Andrew Davis (Picture 1), his older sister's initials were AHD (Picture 2) and they had chalked his parent's car registration letters (Picture 3) on the day that his father brought the car home. Like a previous occupant of Park Hill House, Robert's father was the Manager of Leicester Permanent Building Society and had owned one of the first cars in the street. The chalking has remained there for over fifty years though it is starting to fade slightly now. Times were different then as Robert and his sister climbed out through an upstairs window to sit on chairs above the porch, talking to spectators coming to watch the cricket matches.

If the children arrived in present time by Dr. Who's TARDIS, then few things have changed. Their markings are still on the wall, there are more cars on the street, floodlights have been erected and Reginald Dwight has become Sir Elton John. They could even sit out on the porch roof provided that they wore a safety harness and crash helmet and subject to completion of a risk assessment for the access window. It's a sign of the times.



### ARE OUR STREETS BECOMING TOO GREY? by Susan Eppel

With the trend for paving over front gardens in recent years for various reasons, ranging from accommodating car space and often because some of us are just too busy to maintain gardens in the traditional sense, we could be storing up problems for the future that will affect everybody.

For example the more green spaces that are paved over, the greater risk of flooding as naturally draining vegetation is replaced by concrete in one form or another. Not only this, but habitats for insects, mammals such as hedgehogs is drastically reduced.

Whilst decisions are down to individuals, all this adds up to cumulative effects so that our streets not only lose their colour, but we lose a living landscape. This is a great shame when in parallel, there are lots of people who do not have the opportunity of having a garden, yet desperately would like one – very few flats include gardens.

The Royal Horticultural Society has produced an excellent guide which offers solutions for compromise, so if there is no alternative but to park the car at the front, why not try the simple solutions offered in this guide including the right type of planting in available places, so there is room for both and depending on type and size of garden.

You can do your bit to ensure that once again we can be proud of our gardens and create colour and nature for everybody.

In June we lost one of the greatest athletes and arguably one of the greatest individuals the modern world has ever seen. The above quote by him is relevant with regards to how we treat each other in daily life and highlights the importance of helping others within our community even if that means simply allowing others to go about their lives in peace and without interruption.

Over the past week my officers have been dealing with a number of incidents involving neighbours who do not value the peace of their fellow neighbours within the community. Officers from the Freemen ward assisted the Council who conducted a seizure warrant at a local address. This was carried out following repeated complaints from a neighbouring address over excessive noise issues. During the warrant, televisions, music equipment and games consoles were seized. this could have easily been avoided if we were able to appreciate each other as neighbours and understand what is and is not appropriate.

Outdoor events such as barbeques Alarms from domestic premises Car alarms


The following day my officers returned to the address and arrested a female occupant who had decided to approach her neighbour and make threats. This was never the intended outcome when we became involved but it does highlight how easily something as minor as noise nuisance can have more serious consequences if advice is not heeded. We are a small Policing team attempting to manage a densly
