East - West Road Link News

Local residents from both sides of Aylestone Meadows have started to campaign against any plan to ressurect a link across Aylestone Meadows.

A demonstration is planned for the 4th October at the Town Hall to support a presentation being presented to the full council.

You will recall last year it came up again as a possibility in the consultation for the Leicester local plan. To see the reference to it in the Local Plan on page 68, paragraph 8.19 of the "Emerging options reference document", It reads "A list of potential highway improvement lines and schemes has been developed over many years....such as land protected for a link between Narborough Road and Saffron Lane involving a bridge link across the River Soar".

It has also been linked to a grant request to open up Putney road.

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Local Observations by Mark Ingle

Congratulations on one of Aylestone Park's local takeaways (Chutneys on Aylestone Road) winning the 2018 English Curry Awards for the takeaway category. Embarrassingly, although I only live a few minutes walk from this takeaway, I have never tried it; though to be fair I tend not to have takeaways and either eat out or cook at home.

This made me think of the businesses that operate in Aylestone Park, and how they have changed over the years. Much commerce is now done on-line, and over the years quite a number of businesses operating in Aylestone Park have disappeared – there is just one bank with a local branch left, there used to be a butchers on Cavendish Road, and a number of electrical shops. I suppose the reality is that these small businesses just don't have the buying power to be viable unless they are very specialist. However, the businesses offering services seem to thrive better which is not surprising as it is so much more convenient and time-saving to have these things at one's doorstep. An example of how convenient the local businesses can be is that for ages I had some skin tags on my neck that were irritating as they tended to rub against clothing. Having seen an advert in a previous edition of this newsletter, I booked an appointment with C&M which is opposite the leisure centre on Saffron Lane; Carrie, agreed a price, and the skin tags were removed quickly and efficiently; and so much easier than going into town.

However, some of these business can be a bit hidden away. I see that the old post office in Aylestone Park is now home to the 'Dyson Man', but as it's not a road I frequent, I could easily have missed this.

Another example of a business being on your doorstep but not knowing about it is that a couple of months ago my gym closed for refurbishment; and I discovered that there is a CrossFit gym tucked away in one of the old factories on Vernon Road in Aylestone Park. The CrossFit Leicester gym not only does CrossFit but is now the home of the Leicester Olympic Weightlifting Club. Other services such as personal training are offered at this gym; and I found the atmosphere very friendly and welcoming; the co-owner Jennifer who is local to Aylestone Park made a point of introducing me to the other group members which was a nice touch. Coach Kristaps as well as co-owner Andy can also schedule personal training sessions during the day when there are no other clients around. For Aylestone Park residents, the benefit of having the gym so close to home means one can walk or cycle there, and in fact indoor parking for bicycles is provided.

There seem to be businesses that have never got off the ground; on Aylestone Road there was a DIY shop which was supposed to be 'opening soon', but months later there is no sign. Shame really, as it is something that could have been quite convenient and useful.

Sunday 28th October is the end of British Summer Time - **All clocks go back one hour**, some may need human assistance.

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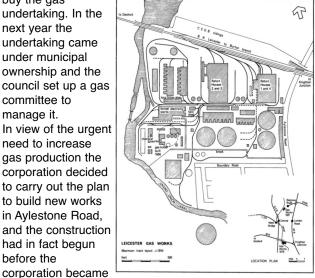
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History of Gas in Leicester

We have covered various elements of gas in previous editions of this newsletter. We have not yet covered how the Aylestone road site came into being. Well coal gas had been supplied by a private company to the city since 1821. For more than 50 years the only coal gas works were in Belgrave Gate, coal was transported by road, river and train to the works but in 1877 the increased demand for gas led the company to plan the construction of a large new plant in Aylestone Road, on the southern outskirts of the town. This decision was also led by the newly built railway line close to the site of the proposed new site giving rise to the cheaper costs of delivering coal to the works.

The corporation at first opposed this proposal, which involved the purchase of municipal land, but in 1877 an agreement was reached by which the corporation was to

undertaking. In the next year the undertaking came under municipal ownership and the council set up a gas committee to manage it. In view of the urgent need to increase gas production the corporation decided to carry out the plan to build new works in Aylestone Road, and the construction had in fact begun before the



the owner. Large additions were made to this plant in 1884, 1885, and 1887. These repeated increases in the size of the works reflect the rapidly growing demand for gas; the amount supplied to consumers in 1890 was almost four times that supplied in 1870.

There is still evidence on the Aylestone road site of the railway infrastructure.

Electricity generation works were sited by the gas works on the Aylestone road site and they too were controlled by the gas committee of the council

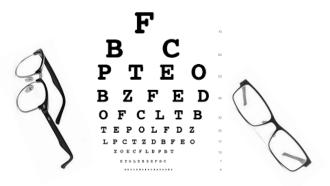
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Whatever happened to the iconic red telephone box?

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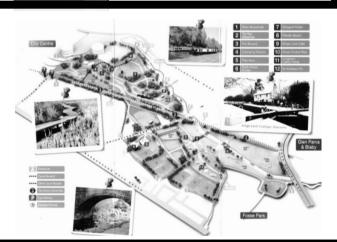
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Community Flood Wardens

What are Community Flood Wardens?

Flood wardens are members of the local community who provide aid and assistance before, during and after flooding events. They help to increase community resilience to flooding in the future. They're individuals from a range of backgrounds, ages and beliefs who have taken it upon themselves to help reduce flood risk within their community. These wardens are supported by the Leicester City Council (LCC), the Environment Agency (EA) and LLR Prepared.

Although LCC aims to reduce flood risk through ongoing schemes and routine maintenance of drainage infrastructure, it's highly important to recognise that individuals and local communities also have a responsibility to look after themselves, their families and by preparing for flooding.

We're actively seeking keen, motivated and concerned individuals like you to become part of the community flood warden scheme Community Flood Plan.

Training Overview:

Training to become a Community Flood Warden consists of a single day's training and aims to cover the following topics:

- 1. Identifying flooding and flood risk
- 2. Roles and Responsibilities
- 3. Developing Community Flood Plan
- Equipment
- Reporting Issue to respective Authorities
- 6. Health & Safety
- 7. Contact Information

Training is provided by LCC.

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HEDGEHOGS

The Western Hedgehog / Erinaceus europaeus is endemic to Europe and is fully protected from persecution by UK law. The nocturnal activities of the Hedgehog means that most people are often completely unaware of their presence in the garden. Unfortunately the majority of Hedgehog we do see in the daytime are often the victims of road traffic accidents.

There are several methods of attracting an 'array' of Hedgehogs into the home garden. All Hedgehogs hibernate during the winter months as their metabolism slows right down. They wake up again in the early months of spring. The young 'Hoglets' are born in June and July.

The omnivorous nature of the Hedgehog, means that it gobbles up a variety of foodstuffs including: worms, insects, frogs, fruits and berries, carrion, birds eggs, and various species of toadstools and fungi.

Hedgehogs are rightfully branded as the "Gardener's Best Friend" in that they will naturally eat up any unwanted slugs and snails (without any training). In turn the "Hedgehog's Best Friend" should be the Gardener who aims to reduce or abandon the use of slug-pellets, pesticides and weed-killer

Open sided 'compost heaps' are like a central larder for Hedgehogs (and many other animals) who will happily forage for the insects and worms within. Otherwise a less-ideal 'compost bin' should have adequate access and be filled with layers of leaf-litter and kitchen scraps.

Feeding stations are quick and easy to assemble at home. We should NEVER feed our Hedgehogs bread and milk. However dried meal worms, fresh cat food, or better still specific Hedgehog feed (available from most pet shops) can be supplied from July onwards before the crucial period of hibernation begins.

Hedgehogs love to forage for natural food in long grass - which should be cut less often in summer and double checked before strimming!!!

Overall Hedgehogs are adaptable creatures. As happy hibernating under a garden shed as they are bedding down in a deep pile of undisturbed leaf litter from November to March.

Note: Bonfires should always be constructed on the day of the bonfire. This helps to prevent any Hedgehogs from being killed as they bed down for winter! Likewise garden ponds should always have a shallow access point or log so that Hedgehogs (who are not the best swimmers) can easily escape!

Whilst adapt to climbing up wooden and wire fences (and small walls) Hedgehogs often need a helping hand within our cities and towns. Providing Hedgehogs with a safe corridor along which they can travel at night is the best way to encourage population expansion within urban environments. This can be achieved by cutting a small access hole (20cm x 20cm) in the adjoining corners of any fences... and / or by raising a fence panel at the bottom of the garden by 20cm.

Hedgehogs are active in the Aylestone Park area, but still need our help to preserve and protect their wildlife status in future.
